Uses Standardised Scores (SS) from PIRA and PUMA tests for reading and maths. The writing scores are based on teacher assessment: PKF, WT, WA or GD, which yield SS of 79, 91, 103 and 113 respectively. These year-end scores are compared to the KS1 scores. If they are higher the pupil scores positively, if lower, negatively. The year 5 and 6 children had levels at KS1. There is a Government formula for converting the child's APS for the three subjects into target SS (source: Primary school accountability in 2018, revised September 2018). Years 3 and 4 have teacher assessments of PKF, WT, WA and GD at KS1 yielding the target scores of 79, 91, 103 and 113 respectively.

The year 1 and 2 targets are based on the EYFS outcomes of 1 (did not attain GLD), 2 (GLD) or 3 (exceeded) for the subjects Maths (number), Maths (shape, space, measure), Reading and Writing. (The two maths scores are averaged so the target might be 1.5 or 2.5; child score 1 in number and 2 in SSM for example.) In addition, some children, who were well below the GLD, are given a score of 0. The scores; 0, 1, 1.5, 2, 2.5 and 3, yield target scores of 80, 90, 95, 100, 105 and 110 respectively.

Reading Recovery Teacher	£33,244	Providing 1:1 support from a specialist English teacher for pupils who are significantly behind expected level reach expected level	11 children accessed this intervention over the year. Of this 91% were discontinued and one child was carried over for an extended programme. 60% were successfully discontinued. And 100% made significant progress against their starting points. Of the children completing the intervention last year 90% (2 out of 9 children) had additional SEND needs. The Reading Recovery Teacher also supported target Groups in Year 6 Reading enabling them to increase their comprehension and inference skills.
Number Count Teacher/ 1:1 Tutoring	£21,049	Providing 1:1 support from a specialist Maths teacher for pupils who are significantly behind expected level	12 children accessed this intervention over the year. 50% of these made expected or accelerated progress. 33% made less than expected at exit of the programme but made in excess of 1 year's progress. All of these pupils had additional SEND. I new arrival was discontinued until they have acquired more fluency in English speaking.  The Numbers Count Teacher has also worked consistently to raise standards in maths throughout the school by providing

Early Literacy Support	£1,668	Reading and Writing intervention for children who are not making expected progress in their learning Phonics Based)	The intervention was delivered to 7 pupils over the Autumn and Spring terms 2017-18. 100% of pupils made progress in Reading and Writing from their baseline assessments. 29% children had additional support through Reading Recovery Programme and 14% had additional 1.1 support on an extended ELS programme. 67% of pupils accessing the intervention made expected progress enabling them to access the curriculum for year 1.
ELSA - Drawing and Talking Therapy Lego Therapy	£1,355	Providing support to develop children's emotional, resilience, confidence and social skills	Lego therapy was delivered to a target group of 3 pupils over the summer term enabling them to develop listening, cooperation and turn taking skills.  Drawing and Talking therapy was delivered on an extended basis to one child helping them to develop confidence and deal with anxiety ensuring a smooth transition between key stages
Lexia Software- Reading Core5	£1,155	To develop phonic skills, writing and comprehension. Targeted and responsive 1:1	71 licences were purchased for flexible use allowing a number of target DAP and SEND pupils to access the programme. This proved to be particularly beneficial as targeted and regular practice for these pupils due to the interactive response of the programme to children's needs
Home School Link Worker	£30,011	Parenting Support, parenting workshops, support with applications for external agencies, importance of play at home, healthy eating and bedtime routines, translation service	Our Home-School Link Worker continues to help identify and support DAP children and their families. Many rely on the translation service in order to effectively communicate about their child's needs and education. Some are supported with accessing goods and services such as the local food bank and CAMHS, while others are supported with routines and



Parent Workshops and Classes	£50	Workshops are provided for all families to ensure that they are able to engage with all aspects of school life (e.g. assessment, English class, healthy lifestyles)	systems to improve behaviour, attendance and punctuality. These actions support families to bring their children to school in a better position to access the curriculum and develop their learning skills.  A range of parent workshops were run by our HSLW which covered a range of themes such as managing challenging behaviour, online safety at home, mental health awareness and domestic abuse. There were a series of sessions covering health and fitness (FIT4LIFE) and food hygiene. These were open to targeted parents/groups. In addition the HSLW and Inclusion Leader carried out a series of 'Supporting your child's learning' aimed at disadvantaged pupils and parents.
			English classes for parents ran throughout the year and a crèche was provided to help parents to attend. By targeting this provision to particular groups and families we were able to take account of individual requirements and experience. Feedback from sessions and projects was overwhelmingly positive.
Breakfast & Early Morning Club	£70	Children ready to learn. Strong links between good nutrition and attainment.	The Breakfast Club is well used and over the year 12 pupils benefited from attending this on a regular basis. This service supports our working parents and provides increased economic opportunity for families. Children also learn about the importance of having a healthy well balanced meal before beginning their learning.
Trip Subsidy	£470	Children able to learn, opportunities for new learning experiences provided	All DAP listed children are offered subsidised trips and visits and this enables them to have equality of opportunity providing a basis for learning from experiences, making



	connections and having a greater understanding of the world.
