We are delighted to have been able to return to being together as a school community this term including having assemblies and playtimes together again, the children have really enjoyed this. The children have also benefitted from the return of our after school enrichment clubs, it has been great to see lots of children have signed up and are taking part in these opportunities. We ask that any child with Covid symptoms does NOT attend school and arrange to take a PCR test. These can be booked using this link https://www.gov.uk/get-coronavirus-test . If a child or family member has symptoms they must take a PCR test rather than a lateral flow test.

Key Stage 1 Update

Seahorses

The children have settled in very well to Seahorses Class. They have been getting used to being with each other again, taking turns and sharing. We have spent the first few weeks of term learning new routines and exploring the classroom and outdoor area.







Seahorse really enjoyed painting and decorating their own paper plate Seahorse for one of the displays in their classroom.

Jellyfish

Jellyfish Class have settled really well into Year 2. They have started an exciting art project on the artist Paul Klee and have had a go at recreating the painting techniques he used in his artwork. In Literacy, Jellyfish are reading the story 'Hairy Maclary's Rumpus at the Vet' and the children have had fun retelling and re-enacting the story together as well as writing their own version. In Maths, Jellyfish are learning about place value and are using dominoes, Deines and blocks to explore this. Jellyfish Class are enjoying learning about algorithms in Computing and loved using the Beebots to write and test out their own algorithms.

Key Stage 2 Update

<u>Manta Rays</u>



We have been so impressed with how Manta Rays class have settled into Year 3—they are so smart and ready to learn! The children have started learning about the Ancient Egyptians and have been able to order key events on a timeline. They enjoyed using google maps to locate Egypt and learning about the key landmarks. In Literacy they wrote some excellent stories based on our class book, 'There's a Pharaoh in our Bath!'. Manta Rays used a variety of adverbs in their writing and have been focused on their handwriting to gain a pen licence. In Art they have been practising their painting skills by creating some

work in the style of Charlie Mackesy and doing some painting with blackberries.

Angelfish Class

The children in Angelfish class have transitioned well from Year 3 to Year 4. They are adapting well to the faster pace and expectation of Year 4 learning. The children spent their first few days in Year 4 learning about their new class name; Angelfish and created some fantastic fact files and artwork about this sea creature. The children have started learning about the ancient Greeks in our History topic (Meet the Greeks) and enjoyed becoming archaeologists. They had to carefully use their paintbrushes to uncover the artefacts and decide what they thought they were. In Science, the children have started their Animals Including Humans topic by labelling the different parts and learning about the functions of the parts of the digestive system.



Sea Turtles Class

Sea Turtles have returned to school this September really well and are adjusting well to the increased expectations of Upper Key Stage 2. They have been very interested in our new topic for History—The Anglo-Saxons and Vikings. We have been exploring their Gods and did some lovely drawings of them. We have also started our new Science topic of Living Things and

their habitats with lessons on life cycles. We have completed an investigation by taking cuttings from potatoes to see if we can grow new plants from this. In Literacy, we have been looking at fairy tales and have been busy writing our own twisted fairy tales where we write from the side of the villain instead!

Dolphins Class

The children have settled in well and are adjusting to a busy start to Year 6. Please remind your children to complete their reading and home learning daily and return it to school for marking. We began the year learning about modern day superheroes, we chose Greta Thunberg and spent a few days researching her and finding out why she is so inspirational.

In Literacy we are reading 'Pig Heart Boy' as our class text, it is about a boy their age who has a failing heart and he is faced with the prospect of having a pig heart transplant! We have been writing dia-

ry entries and debating for and against the use of animal organs in transplants. This book links well with our Science topic which is all about the circulatory system .



Penalty Notices

We are aware that the pandemic has had an effect on families, but the expectation is still that every child should now be attending school full time. If you consider that there are exceptional circumstances relating to your request, please let the school have full details. Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis.

Penalty Notices to Address Poor Attendance at School

A Penalty Notice may be issued as an alternative to the prosecution of a parent/carer for their child's unauthorised absence from school (absence without the agreement of the school or not covered by a medical note) and will be used by Surrey County Council in the following circumstances :-

1. Pupils identified by police and Inclusion Officers (formerly Education Welfare Officers) engaged on Truancy Patrols and who have incurred unauthorised absences.

2. Leave of absence in term time (5 days or 10 sessions or more).

Please be aware that The Education (Pupil Registration)(England)(Amendment) Regulations 2013, which became law on 1st September 2013 state that Headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances.

The Headteacher is also required to determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if leave is granted.

In such cases the Headteacher/Governing Body must decide whether there are exceptional circumstances. They may request that the Local Authority issue Penalty Notices when the absence is not authorised.

Warnings will not be given where it can be shown that parents have been notified that such absences will not be authorised.

3. Finally, the issuing of a Penalty Notice will also be considered where it is judged that a parent is failing to ensure their child's regular school attendance.

This will be considered when a pupil has incurred 7 or more unauthorised sessions in the previous 6 school weeks, which may include a pupil arriving late after close of registration.

If you believe at any stage that your child's absence from school may leave you liable to receive a Penalty Notice, it is extremely important that you act without delay to secure their regular attendance.

If you have any questions or require further support to achieve an improvement in your child's attendance, please contact your child's school or the Inclusion Officer.

Penalty Notice relating to Exclusions

If a child is excluded from school, Section 103 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 places a duty on parents/carers to ensure that their child is not in a public place without justifiable cause during school hours.

This duty applies to the *first five days of each exclusion*. Failure to do so will render the parent/carer liable to a Penalty Notice. (Alternative education provision will be made available from the sixth day of any exclusion.)

Amount Payable for a Penalty Notice

The amount payable for a Penalty Notice issued in any of the above circumstances is currently £60 if paid within **21** days of receipt of the Notice, rising to £120 if paid after **21** days but within **28** days.

If the Penalty Notice is not paid, the local Authority must consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court for the offence for which the Notice was originally issued.

Please be aware that <u>each</u> parent is liable to receive a Penalty Notice for <u>each</u> child who incurs unauthorised absences, for example, if there are two parents and one child, each parent will receive one Penalty Notice.

If there are two parents, and two children incur unauthorised absences, each parent will receive two Penalty Notices, which in this case would amount to £120 each if paid within 21 days.

- Read 'Little Rabbit Foo Foo 'by Michael Rosen

<u>Aspiration</u>: December's value is **aspiration**, some suggestions to encourage this important value at home are:
