

A Message from Mrs Merritt

Welcome back to another exciting half term at Maybury, I hope you had a lovely Easter break. We have a busy term ahead with lots of exciting trips and school events including our family fun day on Wednesday 18th May at 3:30-5:30 and our Kings and Queens week to celebrate the Queens Platinum Jubilee. This will include workshops and a whole school picnic style lunch, as well as opportunities for children to learn about the Queen, the Jubilee and past monarchs.

Reception class enjoyed a wonderful trip to Elm Farm last week, they had the opportunity to meet lots of animals and Angelfish class had a wonderful day at Butser Farm yesterday, which is an archaeological open-air museum, as part of their History topic "Rotten Romans." We were also very excited to watch our ducklings hatch from eggs this week in Starfish class.

As you are aware, the response to COVID-19 has changed from 1st April 2022. The advice for COVID-19 has been brought into line with the advice that is given for other respiratory infections (a cold, flu etc.). Regular asymptomatic testing (using lateral flow tests) is no longer recommended for adults or children. Free PCR tests are no longer available to the vast majority of people and there is no longer a need for you to request a PCR test if you have symptoms of COVID-19.

What to do if you or your child has symptoms:

Adults with symptoms of a respiratory infection, including COVID-19, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature.

Children who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can come back to school when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.

What to do if you or your child has a positive COVID-19 test:

Adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious. For children and young people aged 18 and under, the advice is to stay at home for 3 days from the day of the positive test.

This half term we welcome Mrs Franssen who will be supporting in Sea Turtles class every morning to replace Mrs Sanderson who has moved to Angelfish as their teaching assistant. Welcome Mrs Franssen. Miss Pettengell will be commencing her maternity leave from Friday 13th April. After half term Mrs Melling will return from her maternity leave as the teacher in Sea turtles class and Mrs Butler will return to Manta Rays class to work alongside Mrs Roberts.

As a reminder there is a bank holiday on Monday 2nd May, therefore the school will be closed. We will reopen on Tuesday 3rd May. Please ensure all children arrive between 8:35am and 8:40am.

We have a mufti day on Friday 6th May, we ask that in all children bring a large wrapped chocolate bar or box of chocolates which we will use for our chocolate tombola at our family fun day.

As we move towards the summer months children are able to wear shorts and summer dresses, if children wear dresses they can wear white or grey tights underneath (not leggings).

Many of our families will be celebrating Eid over the bank holiday weekend, I wish all of you a happy and peaceful Eid.

Early Years Foundation Stage Update

Rainbow Fish Nursery

Key Stage 1 Update

Seahorses

Seahorses have been busy learning about capacity in their maths lessons. They enjoyed filling containers full, nearly full, half full and nearly empty. Seahorse Class also started to learn how to read scales.







Seahorses have started learning about their new topic Kings, Queens and Castles. In their history lesson they decided what rules they think are good and we thought of our own rules that we would have if we were the next King or Queen. We came up with some very funny ones!

Jellyfish

Jellyfish class had a great time during wellbeing week at the end of last term. There were yoga sessions, discos and bird workshops! They took part in a brush party also, where they learnt to paint owls. They had to mix their own colours and use different shades to create depth in their paintings.

In RE, the children have learnt about the Easter story and why it is so important to Christians. They then took part in Easter activities where they made headbands, decorated Easter eggs and drew Easter eggs.

This term in Science, Jellyfish have been learning about climate change. They learnt all about how to reduce waste and how to reduce the harmful greenhouse gases in the atmosphere. They then made decisions on how they could reduce, reuse and recycle items they didn't want anymore. They also looked at recycling bins and how to effectively recycle different materials.







This term Jellyfish are looking forward to using tie-dying effects using natural dyes such as beetroot and spinach to create summer clothing.

Key Stage 2 Update

Manta Rays

We are learning about mass and weight in maths. We have been weighing objects using g and kg, ordering objects from lightest to heaviest, finding objects that weigh more and less than 1kg, trying to make scales balance and comparing the weights of different objects. We have been very busy!







Angelfish

At the end of this month, Angelfish class visited Butser Ancient Farm, in Hampshire. The children enjoyed a range of learning experiences, such as: becoming archaeologists looking at different artefacts and thinking about what they were and their uses; making their own jewellery using wire; building a wall out of a stone called flint; taking a tour around a Roman villa and designing a Roman inspired mosaic.









Sea Turtles

At the end of last term, Year 5 enjoyed a visit the local church to learn about why Christians celebrate Easter. They learned all about the different important days leading up to Easter Sunday and created a bead chain to take away with them. This half term we will be learning about the significance of mosques for Muslims.











Sea Turtles have started a new Geography topic this half term, learning about France. We were so impressed with their Easter projects where they made, drew or researched an aspect of French culture.


Dolphins

This is a busy month for Dolphins class as we are working hard ready for our SATs next month so we have been doing lots of problem solving in Maths, tackling tricky multistep problems. For Literacy and PSHE we have been reading a picture book called 'Rose Blanche' by Roberto Innocenti. We have also started a new class read 'Skellig' by David Almond, the children will be bringing this home to read some evenings so please share it with them and ask lots of questions, it's a fantastic read! In DT we have a new project this half term, we are designing and creating our own mobile phone cases, we can't wait to start making them!











Fixed Term Penalty Notice

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not need to be consecutive), they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.

Statutory consultation launch: Proposed changes to the School Admission Appeals Code

The temporary regulations currently in place for admission appeals are due to expire on 30 September 2022. We understand from the feedback we have received that admission authorities have welcomed the flexibilities which enabled appeals to continue during the pandemic. Furthermore, responses indicated that many admission authorities would like to see some of these changes made permanent.

Following this positive feedback, we are now consulting on making some of the changes available in the temporary regulations permanent and able to be used without conditions relating to COVID-19. We are not at this stage seeking views on wider changes to other elements of the Appeals Code.

The permanent changes we are consulting on are:

- To allow admission authorities to decide whether to hold appeal hearings remotely (by telephone
 or video conference) or in person, or to give a choice of either, without reasons relating to COVID19.
- To allow appeal hearings to continue and be decided by a panel of two, if the third member of an appeal panel has to withdraw <u>and</u> either postponing the remaining hearings or restarting the appeal will lead to an unreasonable delay.

We hope to gather views directly from parents, including any comments about the potential impact of the proposals on individuals who may have protected characteristics, for example parents who have English as an additional language, or who may require reasonable adjustments to participate due to a special medical or social need.

Any parents or parent forums who may wish to provide feedback can submit their views on the consultation linked above.


School Meals

Snapchat is a photo sharing app for mobile phones and tablets. The app allows users to share images, videos and chat with friends. Users can share images and videos directly to specific friends, or through a 'story' shared with their entire friend list, which documents the previous 24 hours. In a study, Snapchat was ranked the 4th most negative app in terms of having an impact on young people's health and wellbeing, with children feeling that they can use the app Snapchat to "make you look pretty."

What parents need to know about SNAPCHAT

EXPOSING YOUR CHILD'S EXACT LOCATION

EXACT LOCATION

The 'Snap Map' lets you share your EXACT location in real-time through a map on the app. The user's location updates when the app has been opened on the device. There is a warning on the Snapchat website about uploading images and videos to 'Our Story'; stating that' snaps you submit to 'Our Story' can still show up on the Map, no matter which location setting you chooset." When uploading to 'Our Story'; your child's image or video could appear in "Search results and Stories on or off Snapchat today or in the future."

LENS EXPLORER

The "Lens Studio" on Snapchat gives users the freedom to use their imagination to design their own filters for themselves and others to use. Snapchat states that the lenses users create "must comply with our Lens Studio Submission Guidelines and Community Guidelines and must be appropriate for Snapchatters ages 13+." The "Lens Explorer" in the app now enables users to choose from thousands of these creations to alter their snaps. Anyone can create a lens for Snapchat, which gives opportunities for age—inappropriate content to be uploaded.

SCREENSHOTS & SAVED MESSAGES

While Snapchat's gimmick is that all photos, videos and text disappear eventually, users still have the capability to screenshot or record anything which has been sent to them. Users may sometimes forget that screenshotting is possible and send a compromising image or message to somebody who they think they trust. They may also accidentally send an image or message to somebody who they do not trust. Simply by pressing and holding a message, the user is able to save a message they have received, which can be screenshotted or used against them at a later date.

SNAPSTREAKS & ADDICTION

Snap Streaks' are gained when snaps have been sent back and forth consecutively between friends. The longer that snaps are sent between users, the longer the streak becomes. Furthermore, Snapchat rewards users who have achieved high Snap Streaks, by glifting emolis, adding incentives for users to keep the streaks. Children invest time into making their streaks as long as possible, which can put an incredible amount of pressure on both themselves and their friendships.

SEXTING

Due to 'Snaps' disappearing, (users can even send a one-second photo or video), Snapchat has become the chosen platform for children and young people to send sexually explicit images or 'selfies'. Once a photo/video has been screenshotted, or recorded using another device or software, this can lead to further dangers, such as blackmail and cyberbullying, it is illegal to make, possess, download, store and share sexual images, photos and videos of a person under the age of 18. This also includes any sexual images, photos and videos that a child may have taken of themselves. However, if a young person is found creating or sharing images, the police can choose to record that a crime has been committed, but taking formal action isn't in the public interest.

SNAP ORIGINALS

Through 'Snap Originals', users can watch content which has been created by Snapchat on the app, including comedy shows, drama, news and more. Additionally, there are new Ienses and filters available, inspired by the 'snap originals' shows. This is another feature to encourage addiction.



Top Tips for Parents

THE RISKS OF SEXTING

It can be signify awkward tailing about this topic with your child, but if it helps them protect themselves, it is worth it. Talk to them about the consequences of sexting and make sure that they're aware of the risks. Enoury your child know that 'Snaps' can be screenshotted. Teach them that if they post anything potentially embarrassing or harmful (either of themselves or someone else) it can have severe consequences as the message, image or video can be shared further.

REPORTING A STORY, LENS, FILTER, SNAP OR MESSAGE

If your child comes across inappropriate Snapchat content sent directly to them or in another person's story, advise them to report it immediately. This may include an inappropriate lens, filter, message or snap. To report an offensive lens, they should open the app and select the lens they want to report. An info button will appear above the lens. Click this, followed by the flag icon. This will send a report to Snapchat for further investigation. Reports can also be made on the Snapchat support website: support, snapchat com.

USE 'GHOST MODE'

We highly recommend enabling 'unost Mode' on the app so that your child's location will no longer be visible to anyone on the 'Snap Map.' To enable this, go onto the Snap Map and tap the cog in the top-right corner. Here, change the setting to 'Ghost Mode.'

HOW TO DELETE A MESSAGE

Advise your child never to send any negative messages (or images through gallery in the chat on the app) as screenshots can still be taken. You should also advise your child to screenshot any negative comments they receive as the sender can also delete them. To delete a message, simply press and hold the sent message and press delete.

TURN OFF 'QUICK ADD'

Quick Add' helips friends find each other on the app. This based on mutual friends or off their number is in their phon book. Explain to your child that this feature can open up their profile to strangers. We highly recommend that you child turns off the Quick Add' feature. This can be done in

RESTRICT STORY VIEWS

Your child can add videos and images to their 'Story' throughout the day which will last for 24 hours. By default, anyone in a user's friends list can see their story. We recommend checking the privacy settlings to ensure that this has not been edited. This can simply be done in the apps settlings under the 'Who Can View My Story' section. The options to choose from are 'My Friends,' 'Everyone' or 'Custom' - we suggest that it is set to 'My Friends.'
